2025 Legislative Session Convenes

The 2025 legislative session convened on January 21. The goal of session in odd-numbered years is to approve the budget for the 25-27 biennium. These budget activities include approving the sale of lottery-backed revenue bonds and appropriating ~\$2 billion in forecasted lottery revenue to our beneficiaries. In addition to approving the budget, some of the top issues on the legislative agenda include transportation funding, wildfire prevention and response, and continued investments in behavior health, K-12 education, and affordable housing.

Outreach to New Committee for Gambling Policy Bills

In recent sessions, gambling policy bills were assigned to the House Committee on Gambling Regulation. That committee was not appointed for the 2025 session. This session, gambling policy bills in the House will be assigned to the <u>House Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection</u>. Lottery has started outreach to the chair and committee members to offer to be a resource as they consider gambling policy.

Bills of Interest to the Lottery

Around 2,400 bills have been introduced so far. Lottery has reviewed these bills and will track any that would impact the Lottery. At this time, there are two policy bills specific to Lottery. <u>HB 3115</u>, introduced by Rep. Lively, would prohibit the sale or purchase of winning lottery tickets, an issue the <u>Oregonian</u> reported on last year. <u>SB 914</u>, introduced by Sen. Gelser Blouin, would require Lottery to include the problem gambling helpline in billboard ads. We'll be tracking these bills and will keep you updated.

Lottery is also tracking bills relating to Lottery revenue and bills that apply to Lottery as a state agency or employer, as well as other miscellaneous bills of interest. See the attached bill tracker for a list of all bills Lottery is tracking.

Next Steps for Lottery

In addition to tracking bills and doing outreach to legislators, we are preparing our Lottery 101 presentation materials, as Lottery is usually invited to give at least one Lottery overview presentation to a legislative committee each session.
